PLANT DISEASES ACT 1924

PROCLAMATION [P78]

Proclamation to prohibit the importation, introduction and bringing into specified portions of New South Wales of certain fruit originating from or which has moved through other specified portions of New South Wales, namely Hillston and its surrounding area, on account of Queensland fruit fly.

G. SAMUELS AC, Governor

I, the Honourable GORDON SAMUELS AC, Governor of the State of New South Wales, with the advice of the Executive Council and:

A. pursuant to section 4(1) of the Plant Diseases Act 1924 and being of the opinion that any host fruit from the outbreak area is likely to introduce the pest Queensland fruit fly (*Bactrocera tryoni*) into the suspension area and that any host fruit from the outbreak area or suspension area is likely to introduce the pest Queensland fruit fly into the outer area, prohibit the following, subject to paragraph B:

- (i) the importation, introduction or bringing into the suspension area of any host fruit originating from or which has moved through the outbreak area;
- (ii) the importation, introduction or bringing into the outer area of any host fruit originating from or which has moved through the outbreak area or suspension area.

B. Paragraph A does not apply to host fruit that is transported in a manner to prevent or otherwise control infestation with Queensland fruit fly and satisfies at least one of the following conditions:

- (i) the host fruit is accompanied by a Plant Health Certificate issued by an inspector, certifying that the host fruit has been treated in a manner approved by the Chief, Division of Plant Industries;
- (ii) the host fruit is moved in accordance with the written consent of the Chief, Division of Plant Industries.

Definitions

In this Proclamation:

fruit means the edible part of a plant derived from a flower;

host fruit means fruit specified in Schedule 3;

inspector means an inspector appointed under the Act;

outbreak area means that portion of New South Wales specified in Schedule 1;

outer area means that portion of New South Wales that does not include the outbreak area and suspension area;

suspension area means that portion of New South Wales specified in Schedule 2.

Schedule 1

The portion of New South Wales within a 1.5 kilometre radius of the point situated in Hillston at latitude 33.487 degrees south and longitude 145.527 degrees east.

Schedule 2

The portion of New South Wales within a 15 kilometre radius of the point situated in Hillston at latitude 33.487 degrees south and longitude 145.527 degrees east, other than the outbreak area.

Schedule 3

All citrus fruit, pome fruit, stone fruit, tropical fruit, berry fruit and the following fruit:

Brazilian cherry	loquat
capsicum	persimmon
chilli (chillies), (sherry peppers), (tabasco)	prickly pear
eggplant	tamarillo
fig	tomato
kiwifruit or Chinese gooseberries

Proclamation to declare Queensland fruit fly to be a pest for the purposes of the Plant Diseases Act 1924.

I, the Honourable GORDON SAMUELS, Governor of the State of New South Wales, with the advice of the Executive Council and pursuant to section 28B(c) of the Plant Diseases Act 1924, declare Queensland fruit fly (*Bactrocera tryoni*) to be a pest for the purposes of the Plant Diseases Act 1924.
