

Guidelines for NSW Fisheries Officers - COVID-19 V1.4
Original Release Date 20/03/2020 – Revised 27/07/2021.

- Fisheries Officers should use this document as a guide. It is not definitive as to the measures that an officer can take to minimise the risk of exposure and spread of COVID-19.
- There are various and varied COVID-19 restrictions throughout the state. For the latest information of COVID-19 restrictions and related information, officers should refer to NSW Health website - <https://www.health.nsw.gov.au/Infectious/covid-19/Pages/default.aspx>
- Fisheries Officers are advised to keep up to date with the latest outbreaks and clusters, with a view to amending duties where required.
- Fisheries Officers are encouraged to get vaccinated against COVID-19 as soon as possible. Once vaccinated (1st and/or 2nd shot) if they could inform Fisheries Compliance Management Officer, Christine Rae. - Fisheries Officers should continue to undertake duties in a modified manner and be guided by the below instructions while carrying out those duties to minimise their exposure and potential spread of COVID-19.
- Fisheries Officers should use their discretion and judgement with their duties when it comes to operating safely and employ safe working practices to protect themselves from the risk of exposure to COVID-19 as well as minimising any potential spread of the virus.
- Fisheries Officers should consider not to undertake a duty if they believe it is unsafe, providing it is reasonable and justified. An example could be a fishing location with a high number of fishers where adequate social distancing would be difficult to achieve.
- At this point in time there are no duties that a Fisheries Officer undertakes that are considered unsafe when it comes to COVID-19 providing they follow the necessary government advices and guiding documents such as these work instructions and Fisheries Officer Duties COVID19 Risk Assessment. However, certain situations may present themselves, where based on the officer's discretion and judgement, they would choose not to undertake that duty in that specific situation.
- Fisheries Officers should ensure they carry appropriate supplies of PPE for their rostered duties, including soap and water / hand sanitiser and face masks in all vehicles and vessels.
- Other 'like' agencies across Australia, and documents produced by the Department as well as NSW and Australian Departments of Health, have been consulted when creating this document to adopt current best-practice methods around COVID-19.
- All WHS incidents, including known close contacts, should be reported immediately to your supervisor and via the Department's [online CAMS Incident Form](#) within 24hrs.
- Stay at home if you are sick or leave work immediately if you begin to feel unwell and notify your supervisor immediately.
- If you are immune compromised, speak with your supervisor to arrange suitable risk minimisation strategies.
- Fisheries Officers are urged to download the COVIDSafe App onto their departmental phones.
- Fisheries Officers should raise any concerns relating to COVID-19 they have with their supervisor.
- QR Codes were created for all Fisheries officers on the 21/7/21 and all officers are strongly urged to use these for their own safety so it can be determined if an officer has been in close contact with a positive case of COVID19.

- Program Leaders have been made the first point of contact with NSW Health, if an officer has a close contact. The officer will be immediately informed and will have to go into 14 days of isolation and get tested as soon as practical. The staff and stakeholders that an officer has also had contact with will then be determined and communicated with NSW Health. Where an officer is forced into lock down, the Department will provide them relevant with alternate duties that can be undertaken from home or consider leave requests on a case by case basis.

Record of Interviews (Field based)	Fisheries Officers should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Request fishers to ‘check in’ and ‘check out’ of the officer’s COVID QR code ● Avoid direct physical contact with fishers ● Minimise direct contact with personal property of fishers ● Minimise direct contact for the fisher with departmental property e.g. pens and notebooks. ● Use and have supplies of appropriate PPE (latex gloves, hand wash, hand sanitizer, disinfectant spray, disinfectant wipes, face mask, paper towel) ● Practice social distancing, currently recommended as a minimum of 1.5m ● Ensure only 1 person every 4m² if in an enclosed area. Record of Interviews (Office based)	Fisheries Officers should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Require the interviewee and any representative to ‘check in’ and ‘check out’ of the premise’s COVID QR code. ● Consider whether the interview can be postponed to a later date ● Avoid direct physical contact with the interviewee ● Use appropriate PPE when required (latex gloves, hand wash, hand sanitizer, disinfectant spray, disinfectant wipes, paper towel) ● Practice social distancing, currently recommended as a minimum of 1.5m ● When in an enclosed area ensure only 1 person every 4m² ● Check local COVID restrictions as to whether a face to face record of interview is lawful. 	Fisheries Officers should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Communicate clearly with interviewee during the initial contact on how the Interview will be undertaken, explaining the measures being employed ● Sanitize all areas in the interview room using disinfectant and wipes ● Refrain from offering refreshments and ask them to bring their own ● Cover their mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing ● Section 256(2A) of the FMA has been amended to allow Fisheries Officers to require persons to undertake audio link and audio visual link questioning. This method of interview is also available for any questioning relating to offences, however the person is not required to answer questions unless it is in relation to s256, so they will be undertaking the interview voluntarily. Note that if you intend on recording the questioning in any form (regardless of the requirement under s256), you will still require consent from the person ● Where a face to face record of interview is unlawful request a record of interview via audio visual link 	Fisheries Officers should; <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Inform the interviewee that you will be exercising social distancing for your and their safety ● Conduct a risk assessment specifically in relation to COVID-19 asking the interviewee if they are at risk of the virus prior to them attending the interview. If they do present a risk, postpone the interview to a later date. ● Note condition of persons present ● When conducting audio visual link interview, it is important to establish the identity of the person being interviewed. For example, officers could request the person to hold up a form of identification to the camera ● Record both and audio and video during the interview
