

POLYPHAGOUS SHOT HOLE BORER

About:

Polyphagous shot hole borer (*Euwallacea fornicatus*), which vectors fusarium dieback (*Fusarium euwallaceae*), is not present in Australia, but is listed on the Exotic Environmental Pest List as a significant threat to Australia's native environment, plant industries and amenity trees

Key signs to look out for:

- ✓ Branch death in an otherwise healthy tree
- ✓ Small resin-soaked holes on trunk and branches, with white powdery exudate
- ✓ Frass tubes sticking out of the tree
- ✓ Brown discolouration under bark

Key hosts:

-  Oak (*Quercus*)
-  Maple (*Acer*)
-  Avocado (*Persea*)
-  Tuckeroo (*Cupaniopsis*)
-  Plane (*Platanus*)
-  Coral tree (*Erythrina*)
