

Market Grower Fact Sheet Putting up a farm shed

IN MOST council areas you need to submit a Development Application to build sheds used in your business. Contact a Planner within your local council to discuss what regulations govern your property before proceeding with any plans.

To make a decision on your application, council needs to know what you are planning to do and how. Keep in mind that council staff may not be agricultural experts so you will need to explain anything that is not common knowledge.

After you submit your application a Council officer will visit your property, so make sure the application is as accurate as possible.



The application will need to be approved before you begin any work. If you don't get approval first there may be significant delays and possibly penalties.

Common questions to think about in putting up a shed:

What should I do with rainfall running off the roof? T

What should I do with rainfall running off the roof? The water can be stored in a water tank
or dam, or if uncontaminated, can go into a waterway or public drain. Run-off must not
cause erosion. Erosion is the movement of soil as a result of strong flows of water.

How close to the boundary will I build my shed? Find out the minimum distance from

• Can I live in my shed? No, you cannot live in a shed.

- Can I remove trees to build? Depending on the type of vegetation, this is not always
 possible and may require separate approval. Each council has a Local Environment Plan.
 You will need a separate approval form if the tree is not listed as an Exempt tree species in
 the Local Environment Plan. You can get a private property form from the customer service
 desk at your local Council or on the Councils web sites.
- Can I build in a flood zone? Flood zones are areas that are at risk of being flooded by rivers and creeks. Sheds in flood zones will require special consideration.

Each Council will have its own specific rules so call them to discuss your application with a planning officer before starting.
